<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Degree requirement: master's or doctorate in audiology
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Degree requirement: high school diploma or associate's degree
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Clinical education training: 1,800+ hours of hands-on experience
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Hearing aid fitting and dispensing: adult population
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Hearing aid fitting and dispensing: pediatric population
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	May bill insurance, including Medicare, for medically necessary hearing and balance evaluations

<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Serves as part of a medical team to conduct pre- and post-operative hearing evaluations
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Evaluates and monitors patients who are at risk for ototoxicity (hearing and balance loss due to certain medications)
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Evaluates and treats patients with dizziness and balance disorders
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Evaluates and treats patients with tinnitus (ringing in the ears) and hyperacusis (sensitivity to sounds)
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Evaluates and treats patients with cochlear implants or other implantable hearing devices
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Performs hearing testing for the purposes of dispensing hearing aids
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/>	Performs hearing evaluations for the purposes of diagnosing and treating hearing loss

*States may use a title other than hearing aid dispenser when referring to a nonaudiologist who is licensed to dispense hearing aids. Other similar titles are hearing instrument specialist, hearing aid specialist, hearing aid fitter, and hearing aid dealer.
